Glossary of architectural terms

<u>Reveal</u>: the side of an opening for a door or window between the frame and the outer surface of a wall, showing the wall's thickness;

<u>Hood moulding</u>: gothic ornamental stone moulding which projects over an arch, doorway or window, in order to throw water clear of the building;

<u>Ferramenta</u>: metal window grid to which glazing, especially stained glass, is secured.

<u>Parvise or parvis</u>: the open space in front of and around a cathedral or church, especially when surrounded by either colonnades or porticoes. "In London in the Middle Ages the Serjeants-at-law practised at the parvis of St Paul's Cathedral, where clients could seek their counsel. In the 14th century Geoffrey Chaucer referred to 'A sergeant of the laws ware and wise/ That often hadde yben at the paru[a]is...'. Later, ecclesiastical courts developed at Doctors' Commons on the same site." [Pevsner/<u>Wiki</u>].

<u>Iconostasis</u>: In Orthodox churches, the screen that divides off the sanctuary, usually decorated with sacred images/icons.

<u>kalimavkion headgear</u>: A stiff cylindrical head covering, similar to a stovepipe hat but without a brim. The specific shape and colouring will differ between the various ethnic traditions. [Wiki]
